
# Put in the cards & power on

Put in the nano SIM and optional microSD cards.

**Caution:** make sure you use the correct size SIM cards, don't cut the SIM card, and don't use adapters with your SIM cards.

**Note:** in some countries, you can use a second SIM card.

**Tip:** to make the screen sleep or wake up, press the Power button. To turn your phone on or off, press and hold it.



### **Dual SIM phone settings**

With a dual SIM phone, you can use one or two nano SIM cards. If there's only one SIM in the phone, it's ready to use. With two cards inserted, you can use either or both.

To set up your phone to use two SIM cards, insert both cards, turn on your phone and follow the prompts. To finish dual SIM setup, drag down the status bar at the top of the Home screen and tap **Welcome to your dual SIM**.

**Tip:** with two SIM cards, you see \_\_\_\_ at the top of your Home screen.

### **Dual SIM calling**

You can choose which SIM to use for outgoing calls. Your phone automatically prompts you in a notification to enable this feature. Or, you can enable it any time, tap Apps ::: > ★ Settings > SIM cards > Automatic SIM selection.

**Note:** to quickly open **Settings**, swipe down the status bar or the lock screen with two fingers and tap **‡**.

# Protective bumper

We know the right case can be hard to find, so we've included an optional bumper to protect your phone without covering its premium design. Simply attach the bumper for extra protection.

Caution: don't use tools to remove the protective bumper—doing so may damage your phone.



# **Battery life**

Your phone is like a small computer that processes tons of information and apps at lightning-fast speed. Depending on what you use, that can take a lot of power.

To see what's using up battery power, tap Apps (:::) → Settings → Battery.

To turn on Battery saver, tap Apps (iii) → (iii) Settings → Battery, then tap Menu • → Battery saver.

Note: to quickly open Settings, swipe down the status bar or the lock screen with two fingers and tap .

### Tips & tricks

To save even more battery life between charges, you could reduce:

- Wi-Fi and Bluetooth use: tap Apps (iii) → (iii) Settings, then tap Wi-Fi or Bluetooth to turn them off when you don't need them.
- GPS use: tap Apps (iii) → (iii) Settings → Location → Mode
   → Battery saving to turn off GPS tracking.
- Display brightness: tap Apps (iii) → (iii) Settings → Display
   → Brightness level → (slide dimmer setting left). Make sure
   Adaptive brightness is also turned on.
- Display timeout delay: tap Apps (iii) → (iii) Settings → Display
   → Sleep → (shorter setting).
- Widgets that stream information to your Home screen, like news or weather.
- Recording or watching videos, listening to music or taking pictures.

**Warning:** don't try to remove or replace the battery yourself — doing so may damage the battery and may cause burning and injury. If your phone becomes unresponsive, try a reboot — press and hold the Power button until the screen goes dark, and your phone restarts.



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

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# Sign in

Just follow the screen prompts to get started.

If you use Gmail<sup>TM</sup>, you already have a Google<sup>TM</sup> account—if not, you can create an account during setup. Signing in to your Google account lets you access, sync and back up your stuff. See your Google apps, contacts, calendar, photos and more.



### Tips & tricks

- Wi-Fi network: for faster Internet access or to conserve mobile data use, swipe the status bar down with two fingers, tap and then tap Wi-Fi. There's more in "Wi-Fi networks".
- Accounts: to add, edit or delete accounts, tap Apps (::)
  → ③ Settings → Accounts, then tap + Add account. To set up email accounts, see "Email".

Contacts: to get your contacts from your old phone, you
have options. If your old phone was also Android™ and you
used the Android Backup and restore feature, your contacts
automatically appear on your new phone. Otherwise, use
the Motorola Migrate app in "Old phone to new phone".
Or, visit www.motorola.com/transfercontacts.

**Note:** this phone supports apps and services that may use a lot of data, so make sure your data plan meets your needs. Contact your service provider for details.



# Old phone to new phone

Copying your personal stuff from your old phone to your new phone is easy. If you did not migrate during setup, you can do it any time.

**Note:** if your old phone is an Android<sup>™</sup> phone, download the Motorola Migrate app on Google Play™ on your old phone before you get started.

Find it: on your new phone, tap Apps (:::) → Migrate



### Tips & tricks

- While you're migrating, you can keep using your phone.
- Signing into your Google account copies your apps if they are backed up to the cloud.
- For iPhones, you can migrate contacts and calendar events only from the iCloud.
- For phones that support copying music, not all music can be copied. (If you want to know more, you can search online to learn about digital rights management or DRM-protected
- Older phones that are not Android or iPhone devices must have Bluetooth capability.

# Quick start: Home screen & apps

The Home screen is what you see when you first turn on your phone. From here, you can explore apps and more.

- Search: type text in the Google Search box at the top of your Home screen, or tap **U** to search by voice.
- Open app list: to see your apps, tap Apps (:::).



### Tips & tricks

- Widgets: to put widgets like a clock, interactive calendar and more on your Home screen, touch and hold an empty spot on the Home screen, then tap **WIDGETS**.
- Pages: to add a page, drag an app to the right side of the screen until you see a white bar. You can add multiple pages. To show other pages of shortcuts and widgets, swipe the Home screen left.
- Google Now<sup>TM</sup>: touch and hold Home O, then flick up to the Google icon . After setup, you can access it by swiping right from the Home screen.
- Settings: to guickly open settings, swipe the status bar down with two fingers, to open more settings, tap .
- Shortcuts: tap Apps (:::), touch and hold the app, then drag it to one of your Home screen pages. To see all your apps, tap Apps (iii) and swipe to the left.
- Apps: to remove an app from a Home screen page, touch and hold the app, then drag it to **Remove**. The app isn't removed from your phone, just the Home screen.
  - To uninstall apps from your Home screen, tap Apps (:::), touch and hold an app, then drag it to Uninstall. (You can't uninstall some apps, see "Take care of your apps").
- Customisation: for more about changing your Home screen, see "Redecorate your Home screen".












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# Help & more

### Search

At the top of the Home screen, tap the Google Search box for a text search or tap **J** to search by voice.

When you type, suggestions appear below the search field:

- To search for a suggestion, tap it.
- To search for text in the search field, tap Q on the keyboard.

**Tip:** to close the keyboard, tap  $\nabla$ .

# Status & notifications

At the top of the screen, icons on the left notify you about new messages or events. If you don't know what an icon means, swipe the status bar down for details.

Tip: getting too many notifications? Touch and hold a notification to see which app is sending them to you. Then you can turn them off.



Tip: to quickly change common settings, swipe the status bar down with two fingers. For more, see "Quick settings".



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Icons at the top right of your screen tell you about phone status:

**Note:** apps you download on Google Play™ might show other icons in the status bar to alert you to specific events.

# Volume & interruptions

Press the side volume button up or down to select a volume from high to vibrate  $\square$ .



Also, tap one of these options for more settings:

- All: receive all interruptions and alarms.
- **Priority:** tap **\pi**, then tap **\Delta** to select which interruptions to receive. You will always hear alarms. Set when you want to be in this mode, or choose indefinitely.
- None: turn off all sounds and alarms. Override sound settings from other apps. Set how long to stay in this mode, or choose indefinitely.

# Discover your Moto apps

Moto apps can simplify life and help you out. Just follow the prompts to find out more.

Find it: Apps (:::) → Moto

- Assist: set your phone to adapt to what you're doing, where you are. For example, keep alarms quiet at night while you're sleeping.
- Actions: learn how to open your camera with two twists of your wrist using Quick Capture. See "Photos & videos" for more details. Also, turn the flashlight on/off with a chop twice motion.
- Voice: set your custom launch phrase and control your Moto X with your voice.
- Display: see messages, calls and other notifications even if your phone is asleep.










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Note: your phone may not have all features.



Tip: want to hide sensitive or private notifications? Tap Apps (:::) → Moto → Display and set which apps can show notifications and how much to display.

# Download apps

### Google Play<sup>TM</sup>

Get music, films, books, apps, games and more.

Find it: Apps (:::) → Play Store

• Find: to search for apps, tap Q.

- Download: to download an app you found, tap it to see details, then tap INSTALL, or the price.
- Share: to share an app you found on Google Play, tap it to see details and then tap <
- Reinstall: to show or reinstall apps you downloaded on
- Use a computer: to find and manage apps from any computer, go to http://play.google.com using your Google account and password.

There, you can browse apps on the big screen, manage your apps across multiple devices (such as a phone or tablet) and even set new apps to download to your devices.

- Enjoy music, films, books and more: you can also use Google Play to download music, films, books and more. See "Play Music".
- Get help: to get help and more, tap =

# Apps from the web

You can get apps from other online app stores using your browser.

Tip: choose your apps and updates carefully, as some may impact your phone's performance — see "Choose carefully".

Note: when installing an app, make sure you read the alerts that tell you what information the app will access. If you don't want the app to access this information, cancel the installation.

To let your phone install apps that are not on Google Play, tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Security and tick Unknown sources.

### Choose carefully

Here are a few tips:

- To help prevent spyware, phishing or viruses, use apps from trusted sites, like Google Play.
- In Google Play, check the app's ratings and comments before installing.
- If you doubt the safety of an app, don't install it.
- Apps use up memory, data, battery and processing power — some more than others. If you're not happy with how much memory, data, battery or processing power it's using, uninstall it.
- Monitor children's access to apps to help prevent exposure to inappropriate content.
- Certain apps may not provide completely accurate information. Take care, especially when it comes to personal health.

# Take care of your apps

Find it: Apps (:::), then swipe left to scroll through apps To close the apps screen, tap Home O or Back <1.

• Uninstall apps: to remove an app from a Home screen page, touch and hold the app, then drag it to Remove. The app isn't removed from your phone, just the Home screen. Tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Apps. Swipe left to ALL, tap an app, then tap DISABLE or UNINSTALL in the top right (if available).

Tip: to quickly show app details, tap Apps (:::), touch and hold an app, then drag it to App info.

**DISABLE** removes the app from your menu. To **ENABLE** it, reopen this window and tap **ENABLE** (disabled apps are at the bottom of the list).

If an app locks up your phone as soon as you turn it on, restart in Safe Mode: turn off your phone, then turn it back on — when you see the "Motorola" logo during power-up, press and hold both volume buttons until you see the Home screen, with Safe Mode in the bottom left. Then, try removing the app.

- Reinstall apps: to reinstall apps from Google Play, tap Apps  $(::) \rightarrow \mathbb{P}$  Play Store, then tap  $\Longrightarrow My$  apps. The apps you downloaded are listed and available for download.
- See or clear app details: tap Apps (:::) → 🏩 Settings → Apps. Swipe left or right to see the list of **DOWNLOADED**, **RUNNING** or **ALL** apps, then tap an app in the list to see its details and storage usage. You can tap CLEAR DATA, **CLEAR CACHE** or other options.

Tip: to guickly show app details, tap Apps (::), touch and hold an app, then drag it to App info.

• See app data usage: to see which apps are using the most data, tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Data usage. For more, see "Data usage".















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# Update your phone

Use your phone or computer to check, download and install phone software updates:

• Using your phone: if your phone notifies you about an update, follow the instructions to download and install it.

To manually check for updates, tap Apps  $\textcircled{::} \rightarrow \textcircled{s}$  Settings  $\rightarrow$  About phone  $\rightarrow$  System updates.

Your phone downloads updates over your Wi-Fi connection (if available) or mobile network. We recommend that you download updates over a Wi-Fi connection. Remember, these updates can be quite large (25 MB or more) and may not be available in all countries. If the mobile network updates are not available in your country, update using a computer.

**Note:** when updating your phone, make sure you have enough battery power to complete the update.

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# Quick start: control & customise

Take control of your phone:

- Touch, press and speak: learn phone gestures and commands. See "Controls and gestures".
- Change your sounds and more: to put widgets like a clock, interactive calendar and more on your Home screen, see "Customise sounds and appearance".



### Tips & tricks

- Speak: tap **!** in a search window, or **!** on a keyboard.
- Add a Home screen page: drag an icon to the right side of the Home screen until you see a white bar. You can add multiple pages.
- · Quick settings: to change Wi-Fi, Bluetooth, Aeroplane mode and other settings, swipe the status bar down with two fingers. For even more settings, tap Settings.
- Can't find a setting? Tap Apps (:::) → (is) Settings → Q.

# Controls and gestures

### Touch

Find your way around:

- Tap: choose an icon or option.
- Touch and hold: to see more options.
- Drag: move items on the Home screen.
- Swipe: scroll through lists or between screens.
- Pinch or double tap: zoom in and out on websites, photos and maps.
- Twist: twist a map with two fingers to rotate it, and pull two fingers down to tilt it.
- Home: tap Home O to return to the Home screen.
- Overview: tap Overview T to see your recent apps (or browser tabs), and tap an app to reopen it. To remove an









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app from the list, swipe it left, right or tap X. To scroll the list, swipe up or down.

Tip: you don't need to remove apps from Overview for your phone to run efficiently.

- Menus: when or appears on a screen, you can tap it to open options for the current screen.
- Close keyboard: to close a touchscreen keyboard, tap  $\nabla$ .
- Reboot: to reboot your phone, press and hold the Power button until the screen goes dark and your phone restarts.

### Press

### Power button

Your power button helps in a few ways:

- Power off: press and hold the Power button to choose Power off.
- Sleep: to conserve battery power, prevent accidental touches or when you want to wipe smudges off your touchscreen, put the touchscreen to sleep by pressing the Power button.
- Wake up: press the Power button again.

Tip: to add security to your phone, see "Protect".

### Volume buttons

Your volume buttons help in a few ways:

- Ringer volume: press the buttons when your phone is ringing to silence it.
- Earpiece volume: press the buttons during a call.
- Music/video volume: press the buttons during a song or video.

Tip: for more on volume control, see "Volume & interruptions".

### Speak

Just tell your phone what you want.

say, "OK Google" to speak your search.

Tip: speak naturally but clearly, like using a speakerphone.

• Search: tap • on the Home screen to search by voice, or

To change your voice input and text-to-speech settings, tap Apps (:::) → (iii) Settings → Language & input.

• Dialling and commands: tap . To dial, say "Call" and then a contact name or phone number. Or, say a command like "Send text", "Go to" an app or "Help" for voice command help.

Tip: if a contact has more than one number, you can say which number to call. For example, "Call Joe Black Mobile" or "Call Suzi Smith Work".

















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• Text entry: on a touchscreen keyboard, tap 👢, then speak your message or search text. You can also say punctuation.

Tip: to make your phone read out loud, see "TalkBack".

# On, off, lock & unlock

Your touchscreen is on when you need it and off when you don't. To turn the screen on, press the Power button.



- Screen off and on: press the Power button to turn the screen off and on.
- Screen lock: to unlock the screen, tap 🖨 and drag up. To use a password, pattern or PIN security to unlock your screen, tap Apps (;;;) → (iii) → Settings → Security → Screen lock (see "Screen lock").

• Notifications: double tap a notification to open it. You'll be prompted to enter your passcode.

Hear: tap Apps (:::) → (iii) → Sound & notification → App notifications, then tap an app. Display: tap Apps (:::) → (iii) → (iv) Settings → Display → Screen notifications.

**Tip:** choose what app notifications to hear or display.

• Owner info: to add a message to your lock screen, tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Security → Owner info. To set your message, just tap Back <

Tip: don't put your mobile number as your contact info unless you can access your voicemail from another device.

• Screen timeout: to change your timeout (screen locks automatically), tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Display → Sleep.

# Customise sounds and appearance

Customise your phone's sounds and appearance:

- Ringtone and notifications: tap Apps (:::) → 🕼 Settings → Sound & notification.
- Vibrate or silent: to make your phone vibrate for incoming calls, tap Apps (:::) → (iii) Settings → Sound & notification → Also vibrate for calls. To turn off ringtones for incoming calls, tap Apps (:::) → (iii) Settings → Sound & notification → Phone ringtone → None.
- Ringtone for a contact: to set a personal ringtone for a contact, tap Apps (:::) → Z Contacts, and tap the contact.

- Message alert: to change your message notification settings, tap Apps (:::) → ■ Messaging → Menu • → Settings, and select Notifications.
- Display settings: to change brightness, animation and other display settings, tap Apps (:::) → (iii) → (iii) → (iiii) → Display.
- Rotate: in many apps, the touchscreen switches from portrait to landscape when you rotate your phone. To turn this on or off, swipe down the status bar with two fingers and tap Auto-rotate.
- Wallpaper: to change your wallpaper, touch and hold an empty spot on your Home screen. For more, see "Redecorate your Home screen".
- Language and region: to set your menu language and region, tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Language & input → Language.

# Redecorate your Home screen

For quick access to your favourite things, customise your Home screen the way you want.

- Change wallpaper: touch and hold an empty spot on your Home screen and tap WALLPAPERS.
- Add a Home screen page: drag an app to the right side of the Home screen until you see a white bar. You can add multiple pages.
- Add shortcuts: tap Apps (iii), touch and hold the app, then drag it to one of your Home screen pages. To see all your apps, tap Apps (iii) and swipe to the left.

- Create shortcut folders: drag one shortcut onto another. Add more shortcuts by dragging them onto the first shortcut. To name the folder, tap it, tap the name and type a new name.
- · Add widgets: to put widgets like a clock, interactive calendar and more on your Home screen, touch and hold an empty spot on the Home screen. Then tap **WIDGETS**.
- Resize widgets: you can resize some widgets touch and hold a widget until you feel a vibration, then release. Drag the white circles at the edges to resize.
- Move or delete widgets and shortcuts: touch and hold a widget or shortcut until you feel a vibration or see the icon expand if vibrate isn't on. Then drag it to another spot, another page or X Remove.

Note: removing a shortcut from your Home screen doesn't uninstall the app from your phone.

# Quick settings

For quick access to Wi-Fi, Bluetooth, Brightness, Aeroplane mode and other settings, swipe down the status bar or the lock screen with two fingers. For even more settings, tap .

Note: your quick settings may look a little different.



Tip: your phone has a flashlight that you can turn on and off from this screen or make a "chop twice" motion with your hand.

### Profiles

You can share your device with others by adding a user. Users will each have their own space on the device for custom Home screens, accounts, apps, settings and more.

### Add and switch users

Note: only the phone's owner can add a user.

Swipe down the status bar with two fingers and tap Profile (2). Follow the prompts to add a new user.

To switch users, swipe down the status bar with two fingers and tap Profile (A). Tap a user name.

Note: for a temporary user, use the Guest profile. Guests won't have access to your personal information and can be easily removed.

### Change or delete users

Tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Users, then tap (b) next to a user's name.

# Accessibility

See, hear, speak, feel and use. Accessibility features are there for everyone, helping to make things easier.

Find it: Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Accessibility

Note: for general information, accessories and more, visit www.motorola.com/accessibility.

### Voice recognition

Just tell your phone what you'd like to do — dial, browse, search, send a text and more. Give it a go — say the prompt to ask your phone a question. Tap 🛡 at the top of the Home screen for voice search.

### TalkBack

Use TalkBack to read your screen out loud — your navigation, your selections, even your books.

To turn on TalkBack, tap Apps (:::) → (iii) → Settings → Accessibility → TalkBack, then tap the switch to turn it on.













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Note: you might need to download text-to-speech software (data charges may apply).

To use TalkBack:

- Menus and screens: tap an item in a menu or screen. Your phone speaks the name.
- Dialler and text entry: start typing. Your phone speaks each number or letter.
- Notifications: drag the status bar down. Your phone speaks all of the notifications.
- Books and more: open a book, file, message and more. Your phone reads the text out loud (app-dependent).
- Browsers: enable webpages in your browser to be read out loud. Move between pages, paragraphs, lines, words or characters.

Tip: navigate through your apps and menus to hear how voice readouts work on your phone.

Tip: if Explore by touch is on, swipe down then right to open the global context menu, then use the menu to pause TalkBack.

To turn off TalkBack, tap Apps (:::) → (iii) → Settings → Accessibility → TalkBack, then tap the switch to turn it off.

### Explore by touch

Use Explore by touch to expand TalkBack and have your touches read out loud as you move your finger around the screen.

To turn on Explore by touch when TalkBack is active, tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Accessibility → TalkBack → SETTINGS → Explore by touch.

Tip: when you turn on TalkBack for the first time, your phone asks if you want to Enable Explore by touch? Tap OK to turn it on.

Explore by touch changes your phone's touch gestures so the location of your touches can be read out loud.

- Tap something on the screen to hear a description or text readout.
- Double tap anywhere on the screen to open or activate the last touched item.
- Swipe using two fingers to scroll through lists or between screens.

Shortcut gestures let you navigate your phone with simple swipe gestures (for example, swipe up then left in a single motion to go to the Home screen). To see or change these shortcuts, tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Accessibility → TalkBack → SETTINGS → Manage gestures.

**Note:** the way these gestures are interpreted is specific to TalkBack. Other accessibility services may use the same gestures for different actions.

To learn more about navigating your phone with Explore by touch, tap Apps (:::) → (iii) → Accessibility → TalkBack → SETTINGS → Launch "Explore by touch" tutorial.

To turn off Explore by touch when TalkBack is active, tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Accessibility → TalkBack → SETTINGS, and untick Explore by touch.

### Braille

Combine your Braille display with TalkBack for braille and speech feedback.

- 1 Download the Braille Back app on Google Play (tap Apps (iii) → Play Store) and install it on your phone.
- 2 Tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Accessibility → BrailleBack.
- 3 Turn on your Braille display and put it in Bluetooth pairing mode.
- 4 On your phone, tap Apps (iii) → (iii) → Settings → Bluetooth, then tap the Bluetooth switch to turn it on and scan.
- **5** Tap the name of your Braille display to pair it with the phone.

### Accessibility shortcut

Use simple gestures to guickly activate TalkBack and other accessibility features on your phone. For more information, tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Accessibility → Accessibility shortcut.

### Caller ID

When you want to hear who's calling:

- Read out loud: have your caller announced tap Apps (iii) → Settings → Accessibility → TalkBack → SETTINGS
  - → Speak Caller ID.

• Ringtones: assign a unique ringtone to a contact. Tap tap Menu • → Set ringtone.

### Volume & vibrate

Find it: Apps (:::) → 🏩 Settings → Sound & notification

- Opens sliders that let you set different volumes for your music or videos, ringtone, text or email notifications and alarms.
- Also vibrate for calls: determines whether your phone vibrates for incoming calls (even if the ringer is silent).

Tip: for more on volume control, see "Volume & interruptions".

### Zoom

Get a closer look.

• Pinch to zoom: pinch to zoom on maps, web pages and photos. To zoom in, tap the screen with two fingers and then drag them apart. To zoom out, drag your fingers together.

Tip: to zoom in, you can also double tap.

- Screen magnification: triple tap the screen for full screen magnification, or triple tap and hold to temporarily magnify. Tap Apps (:::) → (is) Settings → Accessibility → Magnification aestures.
- Big text: show bigger text throughout your phone. Tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Accessibility → Large text.

Tip: or tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Display → Font size → Huge.













Control & customise
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- High contrast text: show higher contrast text throughout your phone. Tap Apps (iii) → (iii) Settings → Accessibility → High contrast text.
- Browser: choose text scaling and other accessibility settings for your browser. Tap Apps (iii) → (i) Chrome → Menu :
   Settings → Accessibility.

**Tip:** use **Force enable zoom** to allow zooming on all webpages.

### Display brightness

Your phone automatically adjusts the screen brightness when you're in bright or dark places. But you can set your own brightness level instead:

swipe down the status bar with two fingers and slide the bar to adjust.

**Note:** setting brightness to a high level decreases your phone's battery life.

### Touchscreen & keys

To hear or feel when you tap the screen, tap Apps (::)

- → Settings → Sound & notification → Other sounds:
- Dial pad: to hear a tone when you dial a number, select
   Dial pad tones.
- Screen lock: to hear a click when you lock or unlock the screen, select Screen lock sounds.

- Touchscreen: to hear a click when you tap something on the screen, select Touch sounds.
- Keys: to feel a vibration when you tap the keyboard, select
   Vibrate on touch.

### Messages

To make text entry even easier, use features like auto-capitalisation, auto-correction and more. Tap Apps (::)
→ ③ Settings → Language & input, then tap a keyboard type. Of course, if you don't want to type at all, use your voice. Tap ● on the touchscreen keyboard.

### TTY

You can use your phone in TTY mode with standard teletype machines. Tap Phone → Menu → Settings → Calls → TTY mode and select the mode you need:

- TTY Full: type and read text on your TTY device.
- TTY HCO: Hearing-Carry-Over—type text on your TTY device and listen to voice replies on your phone's speaker.
- TTY VCO: Voice-Carry-Over—speak into your phone and read text replies on your TTY device.

**Note:** You'll need a cable/adapter to connect your TTY device to the headset jack on your phone.



- To call a contact or recent call, tap it.
- To open the dial pad, tap . Enter a number, then tap 🕻 to call it.
- To search your contacts, tap Q and enter a name or number, then tap contact to call it.



### Tips & tricks

- During a call: your touchscreen goes dark to avoid accidental touches. To wake it up, move it away from your face or press the Power button.
- Multi-task: while you're on a call, tap Home O to hide the call screen and look up a phone number, address or open other apps. To reopen the call screen, swipe down the status bar and tap Ongoing call.
- Contacts: to view your contacts, tap CONTACTS.
- Favourite contact: do you have someone you call all the time? Touch and hold an empty spot on your Home screen, tap WIDGETS, then touch and hold the Direct dial widget. Drag it to your Home screen, then select the contact. Tap the widget to dial the person.
- Voicemail: appears in the status bar when you have new voicemail. To hear it, tap \ Phone → \ , then touch and hold 1.

### Make calls

When you make a call, you have options:

- Tap Phone, to see your recent calls, favourites and frequently-called contacts. Select a contact or number to call it.
- To dial a number, tap ., enter a number, then tap to call it.

With call waiting on, tap 🔾 and drag to 📞 to answer the new call, then tap **On hold** or caller's name/number.

- Ignore a call: when your phone is unlocked, tap REJECT. If locked, swipe left to send the call to voicemail. You can also press the Power button to ignore the call or press a volume button to silence the ringer.
- Respond with a text: to send a pre-set message to an incoming caller, tap the caller's name (if visible). Tap ( and drag to  $\blacksquare$ .
- End a call: tap 💿
- During a call: tap # Mute to mute the call. To hide the call screen, tap Home  $\Omega$ . To reopen it, swipe down the status bar and tap Ongoing call.

Note: when you hold your phone to your ear, the touchscreen goes dark to avoid accidental touches. When you move your phone away from your ear, the screen lights up again.

Don't use covers or screen protectors (even clear ones) that cover the proximity sensor.

### Recent calls

View your calls (with newest first), and then call, text or store them:

### Find it: Phone → RECENTS

- To call a number, tap a contact name, then tap CALL BACK.
- To send a text message, store the number, or other options, tap the contact picture.
- To remove an entry from the call log, tap it, then tap DETAILS →
- To clear the list, tap Menu → Call History, then tap Menu → Clear call log.

# 3-way calls

During a call, you can start another call, switch between them or join them in a 3-way call:

• To answer a second call, tap ( ) and drag to . To ignore it, tap ( and drag to .

The first call goes on hold if you answer the second call. To switch between calls, tap the caller's name/number. Tap On hold to put a call on hold.

• To dial a second call, tap 🛟, enter a number, then tap 📞 to call it.

The first call goes on hold when you tap 🐫. To join the calls after the second call answers, tap 1.

- 1 Tap Phone (if your phone is locked, drag up to unlock it, then tap Emergency call).
- 2 Enter the emergency number.
- 3 Tap to call the emergency number.

**Note:** your phone can use location-based services (GPS and AGPS) to help the emergency services find you. See "Location Services" in your Legal Guide.





When you tap a text box, like in a message or search, you have keyboard options.

- Type or gesture: enter letters by touching them one at a time. Or, enter a word by tracing a path through the letters.
- Close the keyboard: tap  $\nabla$ .



See a different keyboard? It varies by app. This one is for texting.

### Tips & tricks

- Move the cursor: tap a spot in the text to place the cursor. then drag the arrow under the cursor to move it.
- Dictionary: to add a word you enter often, enter it, tap the word in the word list below the text box, then tap there again to add it to your dictionary.
- Symbols: touch and hold a letter to enter the small number or symbol at the top of it.

To enter several numbers or symbols, tap 7123.

- Double letters: circle a letter to enter two of them.

## Quick start: photos & videos

With two twists of the wrist and a tap on the screen, take crisp, clear photos with the 21 megapixel camera.

- Launch it: even when your phone is asleep, open your camera with two twists of your wrist.
- See it: swipe left for your photo gallery ( **Gallery**).
- Share it: view a photo or video from your gallery, then tap Share <...



#### Tips & tricks

- screen right and tap 1 to turn Quick Capture on or off. When Quick Capture is on, twist your wrist twice to open the camera.
- Take a selfie: tap (a) in the camera screen or twist your wrist twice to switch to the wide angle front camera.
- Record a video: tap ( ) in the camera screen to temporarily switch to the video camera and start recording. Then tap ( ) to stop recording.
- Capture a still shot during a video: tap anywhere on the screen while recording to save a photo.
- View, share or delete: to open your gallery, swipe the camera screen left. Pick a photo or video. Choose < share, to delete or Menu for more options.
- Change settings: to open camera options, swipe the camera screen right. Rotate the dial to see more options.
- Zoom: drag the camera screen up or down using one finger.
- Multi-shot: when you're ready, touch and hold the camera screen to take a burst of photos.
- Panorama: to take a panoramic shot, swipe the camera on-screen guide to slowly pan your phone.
- Edit: to edit a photo, tap the photo to select it, then tap
- Print: want to print your photos? Check out "Print".

## Take photos

Find it: Apps (:::) → O Camera

Tap anywhere on the camera screen to take the photo.

## Record videos

The camera temporarily turns into a video camera and immediately starts recording. Tap 
to stop recording.

Tip: to send a video in a text message, swipe the camera screen left to open your gallery, tap the video, then choose to share.

## The perfect shot

Point, tap and you're done. But when you want something a little different, play with these camera options.

**Tip:** to open camera options, swipe the camera screen right. Rotate the dial to see more options.

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# Create a highlights reel

- Share: touch SHARE after you've saved it. Or, select a previously made reel from your gallery and touch <</li>

## Capture your screen

To capture your phone's screen, press and hold both the Power button and the Volume down key at the same time.

To see the screen capture, tap Apps (iii) → ■ Gallery → ■ Albums → Screenshot.



Tap **Listen Now** to see recommendations and more.



#### Tips & tricks

- Volume: press the volume buttons.
- Hide the music player: to use another app while your music plays, tap Home O. To return to the music player, swipe the status bar down and tap the song title.

Tip: you can also select Next, Pause or Previous by swiping down the notification bar or using the controls on your unlock screen.

- Home screen: control music playback from the Home screen by adding the Google Play Music widget.
- Playlists: tap Menu next to a song in your library to add it to a playlist or show other options. To edit, rename or delete a playlist, touch and hold its name in the music library.
- · Download your music library for offline listening: to download, tap 👤 next to a song, artist, album or playlist. To listen offline, tap =, then Downloaded only to avoid using data to stream your music library.
- During a flight: Aeroplane mode lets you listen to your offline music and disconnects all connections. Swipe down the status bar with two fingers and tap Aeroplane mode to turn it on.
- File types: your phone can play MP3, M4A, AAC, AAC+, MIDI and WAV files.



Find a nearby cafe, get directions or step-by-step GPS voice navigation using the Google Maps<sup>TM</sup> you know and trust.

Find it: Apps (:::) → Maps

Enter what you want to find in the search bar, then tap it to see more information and options.

Note: your map screen may look different.



#### Tips & tricks

- Find an address: in the search field, enter an address or something you're looking for, such as "restaurant". The map moves to show the address or local suggestions. Tap the address info at the bottom for more details.
- Get directions: enter a place or address, then tap 📀.



- Save an address: tap the address info at the bottom of the screen and then tap SAVE.
- Zoom: to zoom in or out, drag two fingers together or apart on the screen.
- Turn and tilt: rotate two fingers on the map to turn it, or drag down/up to tilt.
- Share a location: tap a location, then tap the address and tap Menu →Share.
- Identify address: touch and hold a spot on the map to show the nearest address.
- Get map help: tap = → Help.













Find it: Apps (iii) → 🔕 Settings



#### Tips & tricks

- Quick settings: get to the most used settings guickly. Swipe down the status bar with two fingers. See "Quick settings".
- Bluetooth devices: to connect a Bluetooth headset. keyboard or other device, tap Bluetooth.
- · Wi-Fi networks: to connect, tap Wi-Fi.
- Wi-Fi hotspot: to make your phone a hotspot, check out "Wi-Fi hotspot".
- USB cable: your phone's micro USB port lets you exchange media and other files with a connected computer. To change the type of USB connection, tap Apps (:::) → Settings → Storage → Menu → USB computer connection
- Automatic connections: when Bluetooth or Wi-Fi power is on, your phone automatically reconnects to available devices or networks it has used before.
- Aeroplane mode: need to shut down wireless connections guickly? Swipe down the status bar with two fingers and tap Aeroplane mode.
- Print: want to print your photos, docs or other things? Check out "Print".

## Bluetooth wireless

#### Turn Bluetooth power on/off

Find it: Apps (:::) → (iii) → (iiii) → Settings → Bluetooth, then tap the switch to turn it on

Note: swipe down the status bar with two fingers to guickly turn Bluetooth on or off

Tip: to extend battery life or stop connections, turn Bluetooth off when you're not using it.

#### Connect devices

The **first time** you connect a Bluetooth device, follow these steps:

- 1 Make sure the device you are pairing with is in discoverable mode (for details, refer to the guide that came with the device).
- 2 Tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Bluetooth.
- 3 Make sure the switch is on.
- 4 Tap a found device to connect it (if necessary, tap Pair or enter a passkey such as 0000).

Tip: tap to rename device.

When the device connects, the Bluetooth status indicator is shown at the top of the screen \*.

To automatically **disconnect** or **reconnect** a device anytime, like a wireless headset, just turn the device off or on.

Note: using a mobile device or accessory while driving may cause distraction and may be illegal. Always obey the laws and drive safely.

#### Manage devices

To manually reconnect your phone with a paired device, tap the device name in the list.

To manually disconnect your phone from a paired device, tap the device name in the devices list, then tap OK.

To remove a paired device, tap a next to the device name, then tap Unpair.

To change the name your phone shows to other devices, tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Bluetooth, turn Bluetooth power on, then tap Menu • Rename this device. Enter a name and tap RENAME.

## Let devices find your phone

To let a Bluetooth device discover your phone, just turn the Bluetooth switch on.

#### Transfer files

- Photos or videos: open the photo or video, then tap < → Bluetooth.
- Contacts: tap Apps (:::) → Contacts, tap a person, then tap Menu • → Share → Bluetooth.













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## Wi-Fi networks

#### Turn Wi-Fi power on/off

Find it: Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Wi-Fi, then tap the switch to turn it on

#### Connect to networks

To find networks in your range:

- 1 Tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Wi-Fi.
  - Tip: to show your phone's MAC address and Wi-Fi settings. tap Menu • → Advanced.
- 2 Make sure the Wi-Fi switch is turned on.
- **3** Tap a found network to connect it (if necessary, enter Network SSID, Security and Wireless password, and tap Connect).

When your phone connects, the Wi-Fi status indicator appears in the status bar.

**Note:** if you see a question mark in the Wi-Fi status indicator . swipe the status bar down, tap the network and enter the network's password.

Tip: when Wi-Fi is on, your phone automatically reconnects to available networks it has used before. If a router previously had no Internet connection, your phone will not automatically connect to it.

#### Wi-Fi hotspot

**Note:** this phone supports apps and services that may use a lot of data, so make sure your data plan meets your needs. Contact your service provider for details.

You can make your phone a Wi-Fi hotspot to provide portable. convenient Internet access to other Wi-Fi enabled devices.

**Note:** keep it secure. To protect your phone and hotspot from unauthorised access, it is strongly recommended that you set up hotspot security (WPA2 is the most secure), including password.

Find it: Apps (:::) → (iii) Settings → More → Tethering & portable hotspot and select Portable Wi-Fi hotspot

**Note:** these steps may vary depending on your network.

- 1 Your phone turns off Wi-Fi and uses the mobile network for Internet access. Tap Set up Wi-Fi hotspot to set up security:
  - Network name: enter a unique name for your hotspot.
  - Security: select the type of security you want: None or **WPA2.** For **WPA2.** enter a unique password that others will need to access your Wi-Fi hotspot.

Note: WPA2 is recommended by IEEE.

- Password: create a password with at least eight characters.
- 2 Tap SAVE.

When your Wi-Fi hotspot is active, other Wi-Fi enabled devices can connect by entering your hotspot's **Network name**.











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selecting a Security type and entering the correct Wireless password.

#### Wi-Fi modes

For those who like to get a bit more technical, your phone supports the following Wi-Fi modes: 802.11 b, g, n, ac.

#### **USB** cables

**Note:** copyright — do you have the right? Always follow the rules. See "Content Copyright" in your Legal Guide.

To load music, pictures, videos, documents or other files from your computer, connect your phone to your computer with a USB cable. To change the type of USB connection (if necessary), tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Storage → Menu → USB computer connection.

**Tip:** make sure you connect the phone to a high power USB port. Typically, these are located directly on your computer.

Note: the first time you use a USB connection, your computer may indicate that drivers are being installed. Follow any prompts you see to complete the installation. This may take a few minutes.

• For Microsoft® Windows®: on your computer, choose Start, then select Windows Explorer from your list of programs. In Windows Explorer, your phone will appear as a connected drive (mass storage device) where you can drag and drop files, or it will appear as an MTP or PTP device that lets you use Windows Media Player to transfer files. For more instructions or driver files, visit www.motorola.com/support.

• For Apple<sup>TM</sup> Macintosh<sup>TM</sup>: use Android File Transfer, available at www.android.com/filetransfer.

## Share your data connection

Your computer can access the Internet through your phone's mobile network — you just need a USB cable.

Tip: to share a Wi-Fi connection, see "Wi-Fi hotspot".

- 1 Connect your phone to your computer using a USB cable.
  - **Note:** if your computer is running something older than Microsoft® Windows® 7 or Apple™ Macintosh™ OSX, it might require special configuration.
- 2 On your phone, tap Apps (iii) → (iii) Settings, then make sure the Wi-Fi switch is set to off.
- 3 In Settings, tap More → Tethering & portable hotspot, then select **USB tethering** to start the connection.

To stop the connection, deselect **USB tethering**, then disconnect your phone from your computer.















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## Data usage

You can track the amount of data your phone uploads and downloads.

Find it: Apps (:::) → (iii) Settings → Data usage

Your phone shows a data usage graph. Below the graph, apps appear in order of highest to lowest data usage. Apps that use a lot of data might also use a lot of battery power.



Some apps transfer data in the background when you're not viewing them. To stop an app from doing this, tap it and then tick Restrict background data.

To turn off background data use for all apps, just tap Menu → Restrict background data.

Note: usage information is provided to help you manage your phone. This may not match the amounts charged by your service provider, as they're not measured in the same way.

To choose which SIM card is used for data services tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → SIM cards → Mobile data and select a network.

#### **NFC**

Near Field Communication technology lets you instantly share content (such as web links, contacts and photos), information and more, by touching the back of your phone to another NFC-enabled device.

Find it: Apps (:::) → Settings → More → NFC

#### Share with Android Beam™

Use Android Beam to share content on your phone with another NFC-enabled phone or tablet.

**Note:** the other device must support NFC, too.

- 1 Open the screen that contains the map page or browser page you want to share.
- 2 Touch the back of your phone to the back of the other device.
  - When the devices connect, you'll see Touch to beam on your phone.
- 3 Touch your screen to share your content.













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#### Receive with NFC

Receive web links, e-coupons, brochures, maps and more from an NFC tag. Look for the NFC logo on posters, signs, store displays and other areas. Just touch the back of your phone to the logo to receive its tag information.

## Bluetooth & Wi-Fi one-touch setup

Just touch your phone to an NFC-enabled Bluetooth device or Wi-Fi access point to automatically pair or connect with the device

#### Mobile payment

You can use any secure payment app to pay for your purchase (where available).

Look for the NFC logo to confirm that you can make a mobile payment. Touch the back of your phone to the payment device to pay for your purchase.

#### Security

Mobile payments, wireless connections and content sharing all demand security:

- Range: NFC only works over a short range (about 4 cm/1.5 inches), so it's unlikely you'll connect by mistake—if you did, you would still have to accept the connection to send or receive information.
- Encryption: your phone uses the latest security, encryption and authentication features to protect your personal information for mobile payments and content sharing.

## Your cloud

One account with access to everything, everywhere — phone, tablet, computer.

#### Sync your Google account

When you log in to the same Google account, all devices can get to all the same apps, contacts, movies, books and music from Google Play. Plus you share the same Gmail, Google Calendar™ and Google Mobile™. To add accounts to your phone, tap Apps (iii) → (iii) Settings → Accounts, then tap + Add account → Google.

## Phone & tablet

Your Android™ phone and tablet can work together to help you get the most out of both:

- Transfer media and files: copy files to your phone and transfer them to other devices — see "Transfer files".
- Phone hotspot: if you have a Wi-Fi tablet, turn your phone into a Wi-Fi hotspot to let your tablet access the Internet anywhere — see "Wi-Fi hotspot".
- Bluetooth accessories: if you have a Bluetooth keyboard or other accessories to use with your tablet, remember you can use them with your phone too. To connect them, see "Bluetooth wireless".

## Memory card

Your photos, videos and other files are automatically stored in your phone's internal memory. You can set certain apps, such as the camera, to store files on a microSD card.

Tip: use a Class 10 memory card.

**Note:** your phone supports memory cards up to 128 GB.

Find it: Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Storage → SD card

#### Mount or unmount memory card

To mount a memory card, simply put it into your phone (see "Put in the cards & power on").

To unmount your memory card (so you can take it out of your phone), tap Apps (:::) → (in Settings → Storage → Unmount SD card.

Caution: do not remove a memory card while your phone is using it or writing files to it.

#### Erase memory card content

To delete all the information (music, photos and files) from your memory card, tap Apps (:::) → (iii) Settings → Storage → Erase SD card.

## Virtual Private Networks (VPN)

A VPN lets you access files on a secured network (such as an office network with a firewall). Contact the network administrator to ask for VPN settings and any additional apps or other requirements.

To enter VPN settings, tap Apps (:::) → (iii) → (iv) Settings → More → VPN. Tap + to add a new VPN. Choose the type of VPN and enter settings from the network administrator. The network is stored in the VPN list so you can select it whenever you need to connect.

## Mobile network

You should not need to change any network settings. Contact your service provider for help.

To see network settings options, tap Apps (:::) → (iii) → (ii → More → Mobile networks.

To switch networks, tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → More → Mobile networks → Network operators and tap a network.

Note: your phone supports most networks. Contact your service provider for help.

# Aeroplane mode

Use aeroplane mode to turn off all your wireless connections—useful when flying. Swipe down the status bar with two fingers, then tap Aeroplane mode.

Note: when you select aeroplane mode, all wireless services are disabled. You can then turn Wi-Fi and/or Bluetooth power back on, if permitted by your airline. Other wireless voice and data services (such as calls and text messages) remain off in aeroplane mode. Emergency calls to your region's emergency number can still be made.

# Quick start: protect your phone


Make sure your information is protected in case your phone is lost or stolen.

Find it: Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Security

The easiest way to protect your phone is to use **Screen lock**. You can choose to swipe to unlock (less secure) or enter a pattern, PIN or passcode to unlock your phone.

## Screen lock

To keep your phone secure, you can make the touchscreen lock when it goes to sleep.



Find it: Apps (:::) → (is) Settings → Security → Screen lock, then select the lock type:

- . None: turn off the screen lock.
- Swipe: tap 🖨 and drag up.
- Pattern: draw a pattern to unlock.
- PIN: enter four to sixteen digits to unlock.
- Password: enter four to 16 letters, digits or symbols to unlock.

To change when your touchscreen goes to sleep, tap Apps (...) → Settings → Display → Sleep.

Note: you can make emergency calls on a locked phone (see "Emergency calls"). A locked phone still rings, and you do not need to enter a PIN or password to answer a call.

#### Can't unlock?

Pattern, PIN or password: if you forget your pattern, PIN or password, you can enter your Google™ account email and password to unlock the phone.

If you don't have a Google account on your phone, contact your service provider to have your device factory reset.

Warning: a factory reset will delete all data on your phone.

# Screen pinning

Need to keep an important screen handy, such as a boarding pass or shopping voucher? Pin the screen for easy access.

To set up screen pinning, tap Apps (:::) → (iii) → (iv) Settings → Security → Screen pinning.







## **Protect**

Protect Quick start: protect your phone Screen lock Screen pinning SIM card lock **Encrypt your phone** Back up & restore Reset Stolen phone?

To pin a screen, open the app you want to pin, tap Overview  $\square$ and scroll up. Tap (\*).

To unpin the screen, tap Back \( \) and Overview \( \) at the same time.

## SIM card lock

Caution: if you enter an incorrect SIM PIN three times, your phone locks your SIM card and asks for your PIN unlock code. Contact your service provider for your PIN unlock code.

You shouldn't need to use this feature, but to set a SIM card PIN that you must enter when you turn on your phone, tap Apps (:::) → (is Settings → Security → Set up SIM card lock → Lock SIM card.

To set your SIM PIN, enter a 4-digit code. To change your code, choose Change SIM PIN.

# Encrypt your phone

Caution: if you forget your encryption code, you cannot recover the data stored on your phone or memory card. Encrypting your files can take an hour or more. Leave your phone plugged in and be careful not to interrupt the process.

Encryption protects the accounts, settings, apps and files on your phone, so that people cannot access them if your phone is stolen.

You shouldn't need to use this feature, but to encrypt your phone and require a PIN or password whenever you turn on your phone, tap Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Security → Encrypt phone.

# Back up & restore

Find it: Apps (:::) → (a) Settings → Backup & reset, then tap the switch to turn it on

Your Google account data is backed up online. If you reset or replace your phone, just log in to your Google account to restore the contacts, events and other details you synced with the account.

To choose what syncs with the account, tap Apps ( ) → Settings → Accounts → Google, tap your Google account and tick what you want to sync.

Note: text messages, call logs and items stored on your phone will not be restored. To restore your Google Play Store apps, see "Take care of your apps".

#### Reset

To reset your phone to factory settings and erase all the data on your phone, tap Apps (iii) → (iii) Settings → Backup & reset → Factory data reset → RESET PHONE.

Warning: all downloaded apps and user data on your phone will be deleted. Data in the cloud will not be deleted.

# Stolen phone?

Your phone has Android Device Manager. You can remote lock or reset your device to protect your device from thieves. For details, see www.google.com/android/devicemanager.
